One Hundred Years Young

ANNA GUARDINO was born on Valentine's Day, February 14, 1923 on Willowbrook Avenue in Staten Island and Baptized in St. Rita's Church. She was to be the second of 7 children born to Giuseppe and Giovanna Guardino.



Her parents arrived on Ellis Island in Manhattan on March 24, 1920. They made the long trip from the town of Sciacca in SW, Sicily. Giovanna was pregnant on arrival with her first child, Angelina. Their first home was in Brooklyn.

The Guardinos moved to Staten Island, and had three more children, Anna, Giuseppe, Jr. and Alfonso. They moved back to Brooklyn, and had three more children: Katerina, Mary, and Lillian.

As one of seven children in a poor immigrant family, Anna relied on the charity of the family's parish, Holy Rosary Church, for their clothes. Anna was lucky to have a sponsor in the church, Mrs. Lang, who bought Anna her First Holy Communion dress. When it was time for her Confirmation, she asked Mrs. Lang, "will you be able to buy my Confirmation dress"? Mrs. Lang said, "No, you will be able to pick out and buy your own Confirmation dress. I will take you and pay for the dress". It has been 90 years since that day, and Anna remembers as if it was only yesterday. Anna had to leave St. Barbara's High School in Brooklyn after her second year to help support the family. She became a seamstress and raised two children. She has six

LICS Italian Lessons This Spring!

Our Italian Language instructor, Fiorella Spidaliere first came to the United States during the Christmas season in 1999. At that time, she was visiting in Ephrata. She returned to Italy in February, and then came back to the U.S. in early May to be married to an American. Together, they set up housekeeping in Lancaster.



Fiorella was born in Termoli, Italy, which is located in Molise. Once a fishing port, it has become one of the favorite seaside resorts for vacationing Italian families.

When she first moved here, Fiorella was often sad and homesick for her birthplace. She reached out to the Lancaster Italian Cultural Society through Father Pistone, who brought her together with Nella Seward. When she attended events that LICS sponsored she felt less disconnected; it helped her to hold onto her native culture.

Fiorella declares that she is so proud to be a member of LICS and to be able to add "my little part to all the good work they do. So much work has been done by the Society to keep our Italian heritage alive for all of us."

Fiorella's part is not so little, in fact. She began offering Italian language classes through the sponsorship of the Lancaster Italian Cultural Society nearly ten years ago. Her admiration for adults who choose to throw themselves into the work of learning a new language comes partly from her own experience of just how difficult it is for adults. "People can go on vacations and enjoy the art, the food, the scenery with a casual attitude. I admire the mindset of people who make the choice to learn the language. When they are so attracted to the Italian culture that they want to go the extra mile, I am honored to be able to help them as much as I can."

When asked what her favorite part of teaching the Italian language was she was silent. Then, "Oh, everything; there is so much." One aspect of the experience came right to the top, "I am so impressed by the people I've met. I enjoy the challenge of presenting my own language so that people can learn it. I love to share in their excitement when they get it, when it makes sense to them, when they are excited to express themselves in Italian."

Before we ended our chat, Fiorella shared her sincere hope that LICS can continue to thrive. As we come back from the separations caused by the Covid-19 pandemic, she hopes we will find ways to grow, to bring even more life to the work of keeping and building our shared ties to the Italian culture, to preserve the old while embracing the new.

We look forward to having Fiorella back in the "classroom" this Spring. We are hoping to offer two levels of Italian language lessons from late March through to the end of April. Details will follow as soon as arrangements have been made final.

Addy is also an awesome baker of delicious treats carried on from their Grandma's tradition such as struffoli, Italian cheesecake, tiramisu, biscotti, Sicilian orange cake and cuccidati, as well as delicious pignoli cookies. Donation of Folding Art Horses

The LCHS Fine & Performing Arts Department is thrilled and grateful to announce the donation of (3) Folding Art Horses to the Lancaster Catholic High School Art program by the Lancaster Italian Cultural Society. The Folding Art Horse is designed for top level art institutions, colleges and adult programs. It serves as a tool that comfortably supports both the artist and a drawing board for figure drawing.

The importance of figure drawing to foundational art instruction is monumental. Not only does drawing the figure train the eye to see proportion, dimension and weight, but it also allows you to capture a figure in motion and gesture. The immediacy of drawing the figure is like doing calisthenics to the athlete, the figure is something you can repetitively draw, yet it is different with any movement. And, an artist becomes incrementally better at it every time with practice. We are so familiar with the figure because it is us, we see it in the mirror every day, but the complex range of motion changes. Foreshortening, weight distribution and line changes with every pose. It is the same, but always new and varied. Drawing the figure teaches us

to see ourselves, at the same time as depicting an aspect of the human experience. The drawing bench or horse supports the artist's weight, along with a drawing board. This setup allows artists to work hands free. The advantage of being at the level of the drawing horse is that the board and your paper is directly below your line of sight. You are able to look up at the model and record it directly. Without looking side to side, as you would have to look if you were using an easel. It's lightweight and simple to move around when necessary. The tremendous beauty of the folding drawing horse for an art room with a modicum of space is how it can be collapsed and stored so easily! Mrs. Susan Ulrich (our LCHS Art Teacher) and her students were delighted to meet with some of the officers and members of the (LICS) to formally thank them for this generous donation and provide a demonstration of how the Art Horses will be used in their classes.

The Lancaster Italian Cultural Society (LICS) was founded in 1999 as an organization to embrace an appreciation of Italian history and culture. An important part of the successful integration of individuals of Italian descent was the formal education they received through their local school attendance.

With this in mind, LICS established an Education Initiatives Committee to investigate donating funds to local educational institutions to support K-12 student learning by providing funds for the purchase of educational resources that were not within the limited budgets of the organizations. Since the beginning of this program in 2017, LICS has provided, on an annual basis, about \$2500 to support educational initiatives in the performing arts, art production, STEM education, music education, and resource materials for learning support students. In addition, LICS has also awarded four art awards, every year, to Lancaster County high school and middle school students for their accepted artwork submissions to the Lancaster County Young Artists competition and exhibition.

Comments from Dr. Stephen Iovino:

"Having served as a high school principal and school superintendent, I know the value of providing the necessary resources for students in art classes. LICS's support of the art education program at LCHS will enable students to produce artwork that will have them grow in both their appreciation and knowledge of figure drawing."

Comments from LICS Education Initiative Committee member, Ann DeLaurentis:


