### Member Spotlight

**Joe Battaglia** was born in Pentidattilo, Reggio di Calabria in 1915. He was the youngest child and only son of Anthony and Antonina Battaglia. His father came to the United States in the early 1900's in search of a better life. Anthony traveled back and forth between the two countries for years until he felt ready to bring his family to the United States.

When Joe was 15 years old, Anthony arranged for his wife and son to join him in New York. Joe's three sisters remained in Italy because they were all over 21 and married. Antonina and Joe traveled to Naples where they would board the Conte Grande for the ten day journey to the United States. One of Joe's sisters and her husband went along to spend a few days with them in Naples before their departure. They had planned to stay in a hotel; that is until Mother Nature intervened. They barely had time to settle into their fifth floor room when an earthquake hit. They abandoned the hotel when the walls began to sway, wisely choosing the stairs (all 102 of them!) over the elevator. Not wanting to return to the hotel after that experience, they instead stayed with friends until the ship sailed.

The Conte Grande arrived in the port of New York on August 5, 1930. From there, Antonina and Joe rode a train to Niagara Falls where Anthony was living. Joe's father worked in construction, but found work increasingly hard to find during the Depression years. Then he received a letter from a cousin informing him there was work available in Pennsylvania. Construction of the Safe Harbor Dam was about to begin and

workers were needed. So a year after his arrival in Niagara Falls, Joe and his family moved to Lancaster.

Joe had gone to school up to sixth grade in Italy, but when he arrived in this country he could not read, write or speak English. As a result, when he was enrolled in school, he found himself in second grade with children half his age along with another 15 year-old boy who came from Rome. When the teacher gave an arithmetic test to the class, both older boys did so well they were immediately promoted to fourth grade. After coming to Lancaster, Joe attended the Lemon Street School located at the corner of Lemon and Lime Streets where the Lancaster General College of Nursing and Health Sciences now stands. He left the school after completing sixth grade.

Joe's first job was at the Consolidated Cigar Factory on North Prince Street, where he began work in 1934. Soon after, he met his future wife, Josephine Ricupero. Her family owned a bakery and she used to make bread deliveries. In 1935, when they were both 20 years old, Joe and Josephine got married. He then left the cigar factory to work for Josephine's family driving a bakery delivery truck for a few years. In 1939, Joe went to work at Armstrong Cork Company where he was a supervisor in the Calendar Department for 41 years until his retirement in 1980. Joe recalled his first paycheck totaled \$60.00 for two weeks work.

Joe and his late wife had two daughters, Olga who now lives in Massachusetts and Anita (Bomberger) of Lancaster, five grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren.

After living in the United States for 40 years, Joe was finally able to return to Italy in 1970 to visit his sisters and their families.

He made two more trips in 1980 and 1985. Two of his sisters have since passed away and his surviving sister now lives in Montreal, Canada where Joe has visited with her and her family.

visiting Ground Zero, the former site of the World Trade Center.

Upon arriving at Battery Park, we boarded the ferry to Ellis Island. The weather was beautiful and so were the panoramic views of the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island.

The Museum at Ellis Island offers visitors a look at the experiences of the immigrants. There are displays that show historic artifacts, photos and taped reminiscences of the immigrants themselves. Park rangers are available for tours of the facilities. To research family history, computer terminals access records showing information about the immigrant's date of arrival, name of ship, their trade and amount of money that was brought to America.

Many of us visited the Wall of Honor which displays the names of many immigrants who passed through the walls of Ellis Island. Today, more than

### Pentidattilo *by Beth Mathews*

Pentidattilo is a village in what was once the Greek area of southern Italy. The name means "five fingers" which comes from the Greek, *penthe* (five) and *daktylos* (finger). The town is so named because it is built on a mountainside that resembles the shape of a hand.

There is a fascinating, though tragic story, in the history of Pentidattilo. In 1510, Baron Abenavoli was Lord of a large estate which included Pentidattilo and nearby Montebello. With time, however, the Abenavoli family lost a large portion of their land, eventually retaining only the land in Montebello where they lived.

By 1589, Pentidattilo was taken over by Marquis Alberti. Territorial rights and boundary disputes arose between the two families and their relationship soon became hostile. In the meantime, Baron Abenavoli's son, Bernardino fell in love with Antoinetta, daughter of the Marquis Alberti, and they began to secretly correspond with one another. When Bernardino requested permission to marry Antoinetta, her father refused. This naturally increased Bernardino's...

resentment toward the Alberti family. After her father's death, Antoinetta's brother, Lorenzo, also refused to allow the couple to marry. Bernardino sought revenge when he discovered that Antoinetta had a new suitor, Don Petrillo Cortez, son of the Viceroy of Naples. On Easter night of 1686 Bernardino and a group of armed men made their way to the Alberti castle and staged an attack. Every member of the Alberti family was killed except Antoinetta who was kidnapped, taken to Montebello and forced to marry Bernardino. When he learned that the authorities were looking for him, Bernardino fled. It is believed that he joined the Imperial Army of Vienna and was killed in battle.

They make great holiday gifts or stocking-stuffers! The following two recipes are from the cookbook. Enjoy!

**ROMAN SALMON**

- 2-1/2 lb. salmon
  - 16 oz. crushed plum tomatoes
  - flour
  - salt & pepper to taste
  - 5 tbsp. olive oil
  - ½ c. golden raisins
  - 1 large clove garlic
  - 1 small onion
  - 1 tsp. chopped fresh parsley
  - 1 tsp. chopped fresh basil
- Wash and dry salmon and set aside. Chop onion and garlic and sauté in small pan with oil until golden. Add tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste. Cook for about 30 minutes. This will be your sauce. Dust salmon with flour. In a non-stick baking dish, place a few tablespoons of sauce, then place the salmon on top. Cover the fish with the remaining sauce and sprinkle with raisins evenly. Cover tightly and bake at 350 for about 50 minutes. Before serving, sprinkle with chopped parsley and basil. Serve with risotto and a side of asparagus. Submitted by: Nella Seward

**BAKED ZUCCHINI**

- 6 small zucchini
  - 1 16-oz. can whole tomatoes
  - 5 scallions
  - ¾ c. grated Romano cheese
  - 3 cloves garlic – mashed
  - salt & pepper to taste
  - 1 tsp. Basil; 1 tsp. Oregano
  - 1 stick clarified butter; 2 tbsp. oil
  - ½ tsp. Marjoram
  - flour and paprika
  - 2 shallots
  - 1 egg
- Slice and flour zucchini. Sauté shallots, scallions and garlic until limp. Add zucchini, basil, oregano, marjoram, salt and pepper. Cook approximately 10-12 minutes. Place in 13 x 9 baking dish, 1 layer of zucchini, 1 layer of tomatoes (chopped), Romano cheese. Repeat layers and top with cheese. Beat egg and pour evenly over the top. Cover with foil and bake 350 for 30 minutes. Submitted by: Giovina M. Bradley

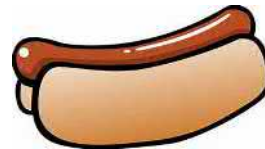
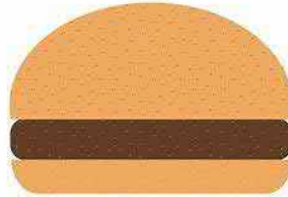
